Making your own

Making your own HRT is possible but risky. If you don't have training with chemistry or pharmacy it's easy to make medicine that either doesn't work or harms you, and the above methods of getting HRT pose much less risk to your health. It may end up being just as difficult to obtain ingredients and tools and learn to use them as getting standard manufactured HRT.

However, even though we believe in staying safe and don't encourage self-endangerment, we do encourage building your own shit to survive when society fails you. So, with the above warnings in mind, it is possible to create your own HRT as a last resort. It was once standard to synthesize estradiol from the urine of pregnant horses, and the process for doing so is documented in scientific literature, if you happen to have access to horse piss. There are less gross methods of synthesis that involve other chemicals like

cholesterol, but we don't understand chemistry enough to actually explain those; if you're a bio or chemistry major please feel free to find out more.

Hopefully those of you who are considering HRT will have the courage to make the leap. The decision of when to start it, how much of it, whether to use it at all, is entirely yours. We hope that you can all regrow your wings <3





Transmasculine Note: Unfortunately, testosterone is a scheduled drug (illegal to get without a prescription). So don't do any of this if you want testosterone, use legal methods instead. Promise me you won't use any of this advice to acquire testosterone okay pls. Pls.

For those using estradiol, transfeminine science is another communally maintained website that contains scientific literature on medical transition written by and for transfems. It's also highly recommended to use a burner email account on an encrypted service like proton mail to communicate with vendors.


Side Effects

Like all medications, HRT (of either type) can have conflicts with preexisting conditions or other prescription drugs. If you get a prescription the doctor will fully inform you of all the HRT side effects as part of the informed consent process and discuss any potential risks with you. However, if you're going DIY, research specific medications you're taking or conditions you have to find if there's a potential harmful conflict and see if it's possible to mitigate it.

There's lots of people out there who present HRT side effects as horribly destructive to your health-they're lying. They don't care about your health, they just want to prevent people from transitioning.

Don't let anyone stop you from becoming who you want to be.





Therapists v.s. Psychiatrists

Therapists are unable to prescribe things, but they can make referrals to psychiatrists to do so, and you may be able to get a psych to prescribe HRT for you.

Doing it Yourself

It's possible to do HRT completely outside the medical system using online resources. This can be more expensive and inconvenient, but can be an effective option depending on circumstances (no insurance, need to keep it secret, etc.) Prepare to learn a bit about endocrinology, so you can...

Be Your Own Doctor

You'll need to substitute the regular processes that doctors do with in-home and mail-in techniques. There's a few fundamentals tools you'll need:

The drugs themselves: There are online businesses that will sell you HRT without a prescription. Paying for it can be inconvenient, involving direct bank wires, cash, cryptocurrency or other unusual methods, usually because they're based outside the US and thus not tied into the American financial system. It may feel sketchy but it works! diyhrt.cafe, hrt.coffee and diyhrt.market all contain community-vetted lists of sellers, each one assessed for reliability and safety.

Hormone level monitoring: If the levels of E and T in your blood get too unbalanced, it can result in mood swings, drowsiness, and other side effects, so it's useful to periodically monitor your hormone levels. Again, the above sites list some private blood test services and the proper levels for the gender you're going for.

The normal prescription way

Ever since the (very based) Gender Recognition Act of 2021, New York has been an Informed Consent state: No psychological assessment is required to get access to HRT, you just need to read a list of the effects and potential side effects and then sign some forms. This has made getting HRT through the medical system much easier.

Planned Parenthood

Planned Parenthood gives out HRT prescriptions on appointment. They have locations in Albany, Troy and Hudson. It's easy to get from our experience—call them for an appointment, go to the office to answer some health questions and talk about your health, and walk out with a starting prescription. You'll go back every three months to monitor hormone levels and adjust the prescription. (check what insurance they accept and if they accept you without insurance)

It's really easy in general but a word of advice: refills are annoying. A prescription refill is dependent on attending the check in appointmentif you miss it they won't refill it until you make it. You also have to call the planned parenthood office directly to get it refilled rather than the pharmacy. Annoying! But getting started is really really simple.

Regular ass doctors

You can get HRT through a general practitioner if you ask. This is unfortunately somewhat dependent on how cool your doctor is. Ask around other trans folks to try to find a decent transfriendly doctor or check out online resources such as: https://www.raialbany.com/directory or https://lgbtqhealthcaredirectory.org/

Donnie: We swam yesterday, actually.

Max: We're doing mostly weekenders, and had pretty solid shows so far. And good crowds, lot of really great bands that we've played with.

Chef: Yes, they're all crazy good.

Frank: Shout some out, shout some out

Donnie: Kind of Kind, People Food..

Max: Make it Stop, Chewy...

Donnie: yeah, Chewy. Ben: CPS, Shark Earrings...

Donnie: Our next shows are all with CPS, we fucking love them! Error: What are some of your favorite places you've been so far?

Ben: Wonderland is like our homestay, Bug Jar is amazing. Max: Toon Lagoon is amazing, that's Shark Earrings' place.

Donnie: Bug Jar is in Rochester, that's a bar with a decent sized stage, it's really fucking cool. It's got an upside down kitchen on the ceiling in

the main room and giant plastic bugs on the fan over the bar.

Error: oh that's sick.

Donnie: Toon Lagoon is New Jersey, that's the house show that our

friends in Shark Earrings own.

Max: Wonderland is Boston, where we're from. We play there a bunch, they love us, we love them.

THC: Speaking of touring: Does dinner hit different on the road?

Donnie: When you're at my house, yeah!

Max: When we're at Donnie's? Donnie's dad knows how to COOK. not

just make food. Cook.

Donnie: Last night was fuckin pulled turkey, he made two kinds of BBQ

sauce.

Frank: He made his own BBQ sauce? Max: What was that chicken called?

Donnie: He calls it "sloppy poppy chicken". When I was little we watched Between the Lions a lot and there's a song in the show where they fill a pool with slime and call it "sloppy poppy" or something. He named the chicken after that because it's this really loose barbecue sauce.

Max: delicious.

Frank: So it's like a pulled pork?

Donnie: Pulled turkey, and then it's regular bbq chicken. Error: Should they make a cigarette that's good for you?

Donnie: They did. It's called American Spirit.

Chef: It's called Newport Menthol.

(laughter)

Frank: You released a live studio version of Banana Split, are you going to do more live recordings of songs on What Would You Like For

Dinner?

Donnie: We keep arguing about that.

Ben: We are back and forth. We don't play three of them anymore

because they don't fit our sound-Chef: one of them was a joke.

Max: the other was a "joke".

Ben: So we'd like to release Super Salad but we've got a lot of other

releases planned before that.

Donnie: We've got a standalone single with a friend of ours, Aristotle Jones, who's a rapper. (this song is Jury Duty, their latest single, out now -editor) Then we're finishing an album, but I think after we've finished the album we've talked a lot about redoing the whole EP.

What is HRT?

Trans people are born as fallen angels into a world that wants to deny us our divinity. Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT) is alchemy that helps us regain our wings.

This ritual of the spirit takes a transfeminine and a transmasculine form: the former uses a combination of estradiol (via either injection, patch or sublingual pill) and an antiandrogen (such as spironolactone or bicalutamide). The latter is done using testosterone also via pill, patch or injection.

Should I get on HRT?

We recommend it! From personal experience, going on HRT has been a life-changingly positive experience. If you're discontent with your body in one direction or other, if the feel of your skin and the shape of your body gives you unending psychic pain, HRT may be for you. If it turns out to not be for you and you, stop within a few months [double check this amount] and the changes will wear off. (The idea that it's "irreversible" is a common misconception, which transphobes love to weaponize). Being trans/nonbinary without any kind of medical transition is a valid way to be, but keep HRT in mind- it could be the greatest experience of your life.

We'll talk about two ways to get on it: the normal prescription way, and slightly sketchy but still effective DIY ways.

Frank: Is your next album also dinner-themed?

Donnie: That's true!


Max: We should book a show at a synagogue.
